Mandatory to be eligible for top 10% Automatic Admission.

<u>Performance</u> <u>Acknowledgements</u>

A student may earn a performance acknowledgment for outstanding performance:

Endorsements

- Texas Education Code requires all students to declare an endorsement by the end of the 8^{th} grade.
- Parents must officially sign approval of the endorsement (usually inside Skyward).
- High School counselors work with incoming freshmen to complete a 4 year plan that maps out tentative courses that a student will take while in high school.
- NOTE: An endorsement is a Texas graduation requirement, not a college requirement.

Endorsements

There are 5 endorsements set forth by the Texas Legislature:

- STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics)
- Arts and Humanities
- Business and Industry
- Public Service
- Multidisciplinary Studies

STEM

To get a STEM Endorsement, a student must have:

- 4 credits English
- 4 credits Mathematics
- 4 credits Science
- 4 credits Social Studies
- 2 credits in same Language Other than English
- 1 credit in Physical Education
- 1 credit in Fine Arts

Business and Industry

To get a Business and Industry Endorsement, a student must have:

- 4 credits English
- 4 credits Mathematics
- 4 credits Science
- 4 credits Social Studies
- 2 credits in same Language Other than English
- 1 credit in Physical Education
- 1 credit in Fine Arts

Public Service

To get a Public Service Endorsement, a student must have:

- 4 credits English
- 4 credits Mathematics
- 4 credits Science
- 4 credits Social Studies
- 2 credits in same Language Other than English
- 1 credit in Physical Education
- 1 credit in Fine Arts

Arts & Humanities

To get an Arts & Humanities Endorsement, a student must have:

- 4 credits English
- 4 credits Mathematics
- 4 credits Science
- 4 credits Social Studies
- 2 credits in same Language Other than English
- 1 credit in Physical Education
- 1 credit in Fine Arts

Multidisciplinary

To get a Multidisciplinary Endorsement, a student must have:

- 4 credits English
- 4 credits Mathematics
- 4 credits Science
- 4 credits Social Studies
- 2 credits in same Language Other than English
- 1 credit in Physical Education
- 1 credit in Fine Arts
